The Fine Family Academy of Educators has grown and matured since its inception in 2019. A rigorous application based on scholarly engagement and professional accomplishment was developed. The Academy Advisory Group was established with selected members of the first membership cohort and with a term of three years to assist with the FFAOE practices and procedures, infrastructure, and activities. Three Work Teams were established 1) to address programming needs and educator development, 2) to promote membership, and 3) to develop and implement a communication strategy for the academy.

Activities

Activities create an atmosphere of increased collegiality and provide enhanced scholarly activities and leadership opportunities. New programs were launched, including a Journal Club for members and educational consultation service. The Journal Club allows for the exploration and reading of published scholarly work with active discussion of connections with educators' current perspectives and work. The Journal Club began with the concept of leadership which plays an essential role in the development of faculty and teachers' identity.

To date, the Academy has sponsored 16 programs over the past 18 months, including eight workshops, four

educational grand Rounds, and four special events. Please refer to Appendix #1 for more information.

Nationally prominent scholars in medical education engaged with faculty. These programs were hosted by the academy but offered to all EVMS faculty. Topics represented a wide range of professional development workshops subjects, such as, "Providing Effective Feedback to Learners," "Educational Scholarship: Creating a Plan for Your Educator Work," and "Transforming our Thinking about Professional Lapses: Intervening in the Moment and Supporting a Culture of Professionalism." Unfortunately, as a result of COVID-19, several of the offerings were postponed while others were adapted and presented virtually to continue providing learning opportunities to faculty.

Program Highlights

Annual Educational Symposium

On April 17, 2019, the first Annual Educational Symposium took place. Two nationally recognized leaders in the field of educational assessment worked with 60 faculty members on the principles and practice of performance assessment in education. Few faculty in health professions schools have any formal training in assessment, which makes decision making about practices difficult. Competency-based education, remediation, standards setting, learning trajectories, and individualized learning plans all place a significant burden on a school's ability to assess learners with validity and efficiency. Larry Gruppen, PhD (Professor of Learning Health Sciences at the University of Michigan Medical School), and Sebastian Uijtdehaage, PhD (Professor, Uniformed Services University), shared experience and advice on the design of a performance assessment process and a programmatic approach to the assessment of competence.

The second Annual Educational Symposium was arranged for March 2020 with guest speakers from the George Washington School of Medicine. The focus of this symposium was "Promoting Student Learning and Content Integration."

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the symposium was postponed. The speakers were invited to deliver virtually but were unable to commit at that time with their focus directed to moving the GWU medical school curriculum online.

Educational Scholarship Day

Educational Scholarship Day in May 2019 featured Alice Fornari, PhD, Associate Dean, Educational Skills Development, Zucker School of Medicine at Hofstra/Northwell, who gave the keynote address, "Preparing Faculty to be Humanistic Mentors Across the Continuum of Medical Education." Additionally, she facilitated the workshop, "Educational Pearls: Self-Regulated Learning, Deliberate Practice and Adaptive Expertise.

The 2020 Educational Scholarship Day was canceled due to COVID-19. The keynote address was to be presented by a highly influential researcher in the area of medical education: Patricia O'Sullivan, EdD, Professor of Medicine and Surgery, and Director, Research and Development in Medical Education, University of California.

Educational Grand Rounds

A series of Educational Grand Rounds was launched beginning in December 2019. The goal was to host four nationally recognized speakers each year. Before

March 2020, two Educational Grand Rounds have been offered including, "Turning Your Teaching into Scholarship" delivered by Kathryn Huggett, PhD, Professor and Director of the Teaching Academy and Assistant Dean for Medical Education at the Larner College of Medicine, University of Vermont. Two grand rounds are being considered for this fall, in September and November.

Medical Education Research Program (MERC)

The American Association of Medical Colleges offers the Medical Education Research Program, whose purpose is to provide the knowledge necessary to understand the purposes and processes of medical education research, to become informed consumers of the medical education literature, and to be effective collaborators in medical education research. The program offers several courses targeted to clinicians and other educators who desire to learn research skills that will enable collaborative participation in medical education research projects. Each three-hour workshop focuses on a key skill or area in educational research and emphasizes opportunities for hands-on activities and active participation. Once faculty members have completed six workshops, they qualify for a certificate.

In December 2019, Jean Bailey, PhD, of Virginia Commonwealth University School of Medicine, presented the workshop, "Program Evaluation and Evaluation Research." A subsequent workshop planned for April 2020 to be delivered by Nicole Borges, PhD, Giesel School of Medicine at Dartmouth, was postponed due to COVID-19.

Virginia Regional Health Sciences Education Symposium

This inaugural Virginia Regional Health Sciences Education Symposium was hosted by Virginia Commonwealth University. The academy joined with the University of Virginia and Virginia Tech to plan and implement the event in early 2020. Faculty from across the state submitted abstracts that were reviewed for acceptance as an oral presentation, workshop, or poster. Of six oral presentations given, two represented the work of academy members. Overall, EVMS was represented by the acceptance of 16 abstracts delivered as oral presentations, tabletop discussions, or posters. Please refer to Appendix #2 for more information.

EVMS Service and Recognition Awards

Every October, EVMS holds an Employee Service and Recognition Awards Ceremony. Three academy-sponsored educational awards will be launched at the 2020 virtual ceremony.

The Fine Family Academy of Educators Awards for Educational Excellence are designed to recognize and celebrate outstanding educators and acknowledge achievements in education.

1. Educational Innovation in Curriculum Development, Teaching, or Assessment

This award will recognize an individual for having developed an innovative portion of a curriculum or played a significant role in the design of a curriculum following educationally sound principles; or adopted and successfully incorporated a new teaching method or an assessment tool. This award is meant to encourage faculty members of the EVMS community to creatively apply their talents to improve the experience of our learners

2. Educational Leadership

This award acknowledges and celebrates exemplary leadership at various levels of seniority that has a significant and positive impact on advancing the educational experience of our learners. This award will be given to a faculty member who demonstrates a record of significant leadership that matches or exceeds the record presented in the standard-setting examples. Examples include serving as director of a module, course, program, or clerkship; chairing or serving on an education-related committee; leading an Academy of Educators work team or helping with the development of the academy; or receiving an educational-related grant that supports training or programs.

3. Educational Scholarship

The Educational Scholarship Award is designed primarily for the faculty member who has examples of educational scholarship work that are broadly disseminated. We seek to define scholarship broadly. According to Boyers Model of Scholarship, it can include:

Scholarship of Discovery Building new knowledge through traditional research, e.g., publishing in peer-reviewed forums, producing and/or performing creative work within established field, creating infrastructure for future studies.

Scholarship of Integration Work that makes connections across disciplines, seeks to interpret, draw together, and bring new insight to bear on original research, e.g., preparing a comprehensive literature review, collaborating with colleagues to design and deliver a core course, publication of a textbook or other influential work for use in multiple fields/disciplines.

Scholarship of Application Considers how scholarly investigation and knowledge can be applied to identified problems/issues, e.g., serving as an external consultant, assuming leadership roles in professional organizations.

Scholarship of Teaching and Learning Makes links between educational theory, knowledge and application to teaching practice. Study of teaching models and practices to achieve optimal learning, e.g., advancing learning theory through classroom/other setting research, developing and testing instructional materials, teaching that stimulates active learning and encourages critical, creative thinking, developing, and implementing a program-level assessment system.

The impact of COVID-19 has had enormous implications for the delivery of education to health professionals. Faculty have worked tirelessly to adapt teaching modalities to the virtual environment. For some, this is an entirely new experience. In support of our faculty, the FFAOE developed a dedicated section of the Blackboard Learning Management System. Resources have been added and will continue to be added. A section on teaching in small groups in the virtual environment has been populated with resources.

Looking Ahead

While the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic is still unpredictable, the development of the Fine Family Academy of Educators will still progress.

Recruitment of new members and review of applications will continue. Over the next year we will develop and release two additional membership categories.

- The category of Affiliate will be offered to our community faculty who are a tremendous resource to our students. Membership in this category will provide support to their educational endeavors and promote collegial relationships with other academy members.
- The Protégé category will be offered to residents and fin of this category, as well as involvement in academy activities, will shape the identity of these future educators.

A Peer Observation Program will be launched to support faculty educators. This is a supportive process in which one faculty member is observed in practice by another. It aims to share best practice approaches to the delivery of teaching and education.

Educational grand rounds and professional development workshops have been planned. Until the COVID-19 restrictions are lifted, these will be offered using a virtual format. Faculty invited to present at these events represent Harvard Medical School, University of Virginia, and Virginia Tech. Educational Scholarship Day will be held in May 2021.
