EVMS enjoys a unique relationship with the people of southeastern Virginia, an area known as Hampton Roads. It all began 50 years ago, when community leaders created EVMS to address the region's serious shortage of physicians. Today, the relationship is stronger than ever as EVMS continues to safeguard the community's health.

To keep pace with the region's growth over the last half century, EVMS has added and enlarged educational programs. Similarly, the school's clinical and research missions target the health issues that confront the people of Hampton Roads. EVMS researchers and physician-scientists work together to rapidly translate laboratory discoveries into new treatments to help patients.

Given EVMS' deep roots in the community, it's no surprise that students, faculty and staff embrace the school's commitment to service. Community service is a part of the school's DNA and "service learning" is an integral part of the medical school curriculum, encouraging future health professionals and healthcare providers to adopt a lifelong commitment to service.

Graduate Medical Education (Residency Training)

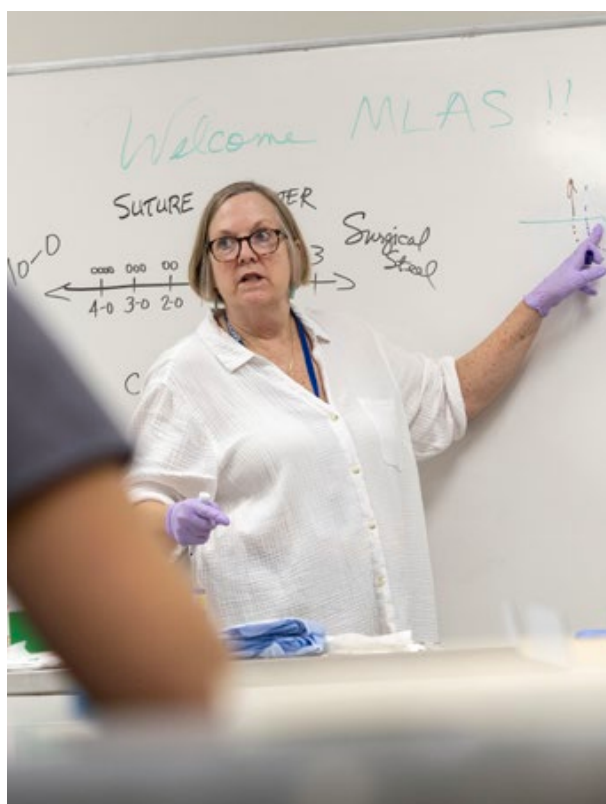

Medical Modeling and Simulation

EVMS was among the first medical schools in the country to use “standardized” patients — trained individuals who portray patients — to teach students how to perform clinical exams and communicate effectively with patients. With the establishment of the Sentara Center for Simulation and Immersive Learning at EVMS, the school continues to be an innovator in developing new ways to use technology to teach common medical procedures and to provide students with a safe environment in which to practice and perfect their technique. The simulation center is accredited by the Society for Simulation in Healthcare.

The center put on **3,298 events** during which it provided training for **37,295 learners** — both from EVMS and other institutions locally

The center works with **90 external clients**, including other medical schools

The center offers life-support courses, with **45 instructors** certified in basic and advanced lifesaving training

Staff includes **27 full-time** and **137 standardized patients**

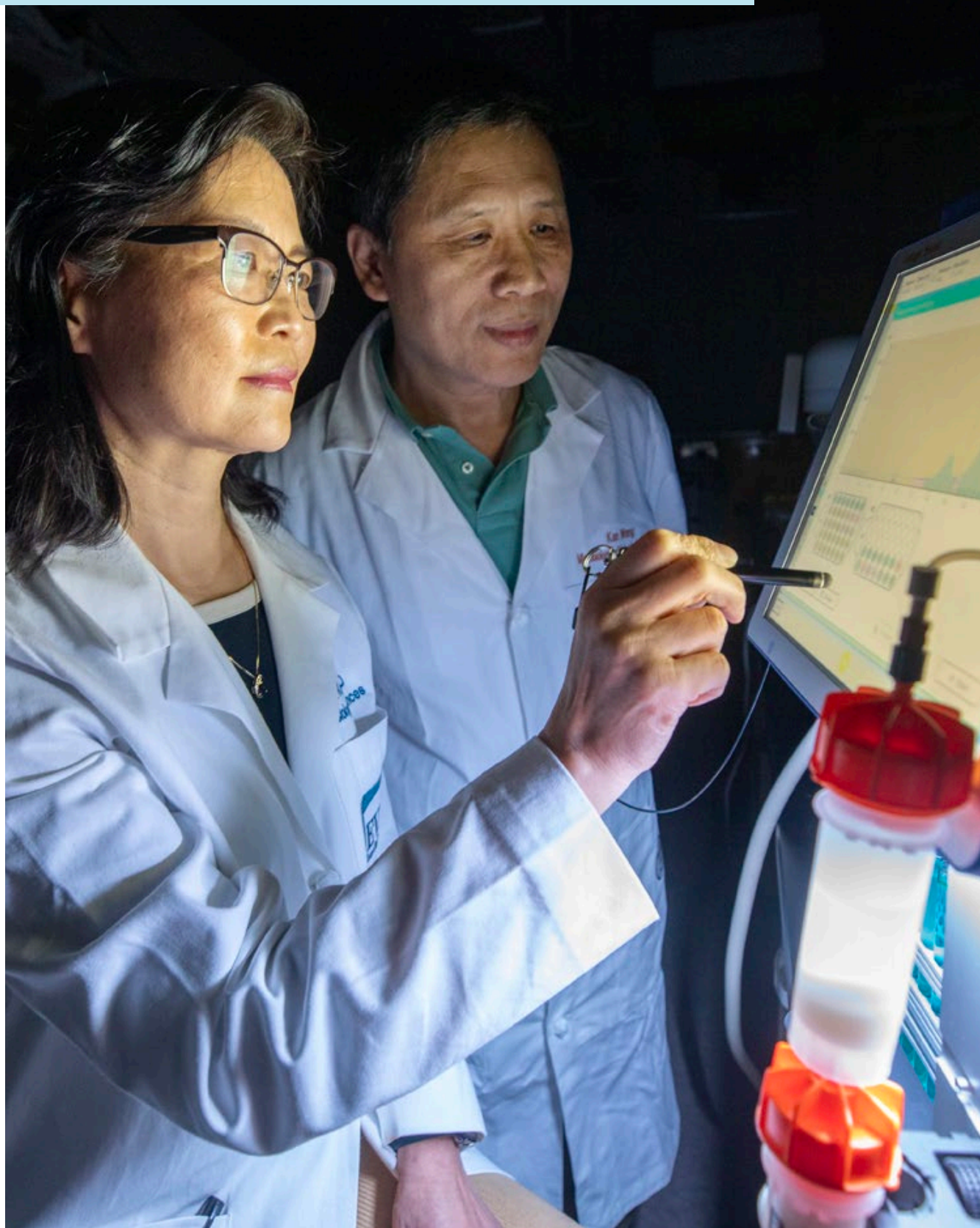

Research

EVMS strives to enhance its research enterprise in order to improve the health of the people of Hampton Roads and beyond. EVMS carries out focused research in several specialty centers, including:

Biorepository

A College of American Pathology accredited program to acquire, process and share bio-specimens for research.

Center for Integrative Neuroscience and Inflammatory Diseases

Conducts basic and translational research in movement disorders and neurocognitive decline.

Leroy T. Canoles Jr. Cancer Research Center

Dedicated to translational research studies that lead directly to improved care and new biomarkers.

Center for Women and Infant Health Equity and Advocacy

Focused on reducing health disparity for mothers and their children by focusing on clinical practice quality and safety using epidemiological and effectiveness data to drive guidelines and policy.

EVMS-Sentara Collaborative Integrated Neurodegenerative Disorders Center

Conducts multidisciplinary, patient-oriented clinical and basic research to improve the understanding and treatments of Alzheimer's Disease, Parkinson's Disease and other aging-related neurodegenerative disorders.

Clinical programs with community outcomes

Some of the care is unique. For instance, EVMS specialists are the only ones in the region to provide care for women experiencing high-risk pregnancies.

In addition to their duties as teachers and scientists, these physicians and surgeons care for more than 1,600 people every day at 71 clinical practice sites.

Community

Established through a grassroots campaign, EVMS was founded by the community for the community. So it should come as no surprise that EVMS enjoys a special connection with the people of Hampton Roads.

Faculty, students and staff strive daily to fulfill the school's vision to be the nation's most community-oriented school of medicine and health professions.

In FY 2023, some **730 EVMS student volunteers** provided more than **21,000** hours of community engagement, which impacted an estimated **8,500** individuals living in the region. That includes events hosted, sponsored or organized by EVMS in **14 cities** - mostly in Hampton Roads.

Among the activities were educational lectures, health fairs, telehealth sessions with Street Health, HOPES Free Clinic (the first student-run free clinic in Virginia) and vaccination efforts, Health Science Academy for high-school age youth and many others.

Community-Engaged Learning initiatives such as Bystander CPR and Community Stroke Awareness taught valuable skills to community members, while other initiatives like Adaptive Gymnastics helped young athletes with neurological, physical or developmental disabilities.

Among the longest-running initiatives is the Medical & Health Specialties Program at Norfolk's Maury High School. The program brings high school students with an interest in a career in health or medicine to the EVMS campus on a regular basis.

One of the school's newest initiatives is the EVMS Health Sciences Academy, an immersive, two-week experience that introduces participants to a range of career tracks in medicine and healthcare. The program, supported by donors, includes a wide range of hands-on activities.

COMMUNITY

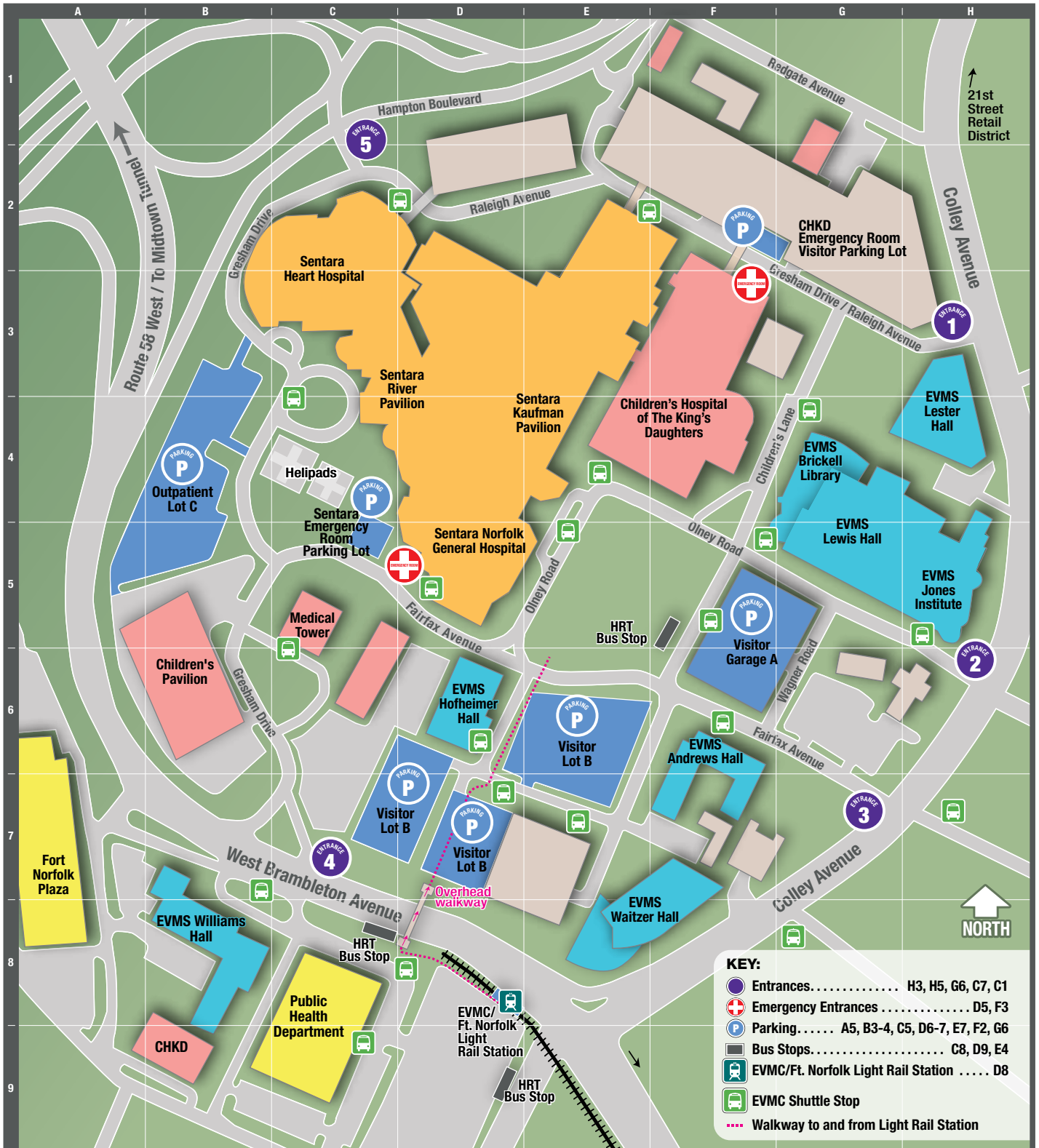
Economic Impact

When noted regional economist James Koch, PhD, last reported on his evaluation of the school’s economic imprint on the region in 2017, he found that EVMS-related economic activity grew at more than twice the pace of the region in the last five years. He estimated the school’s annual impact at \$1.2 billion, a 21.4 percent increase from just five years earlier.
